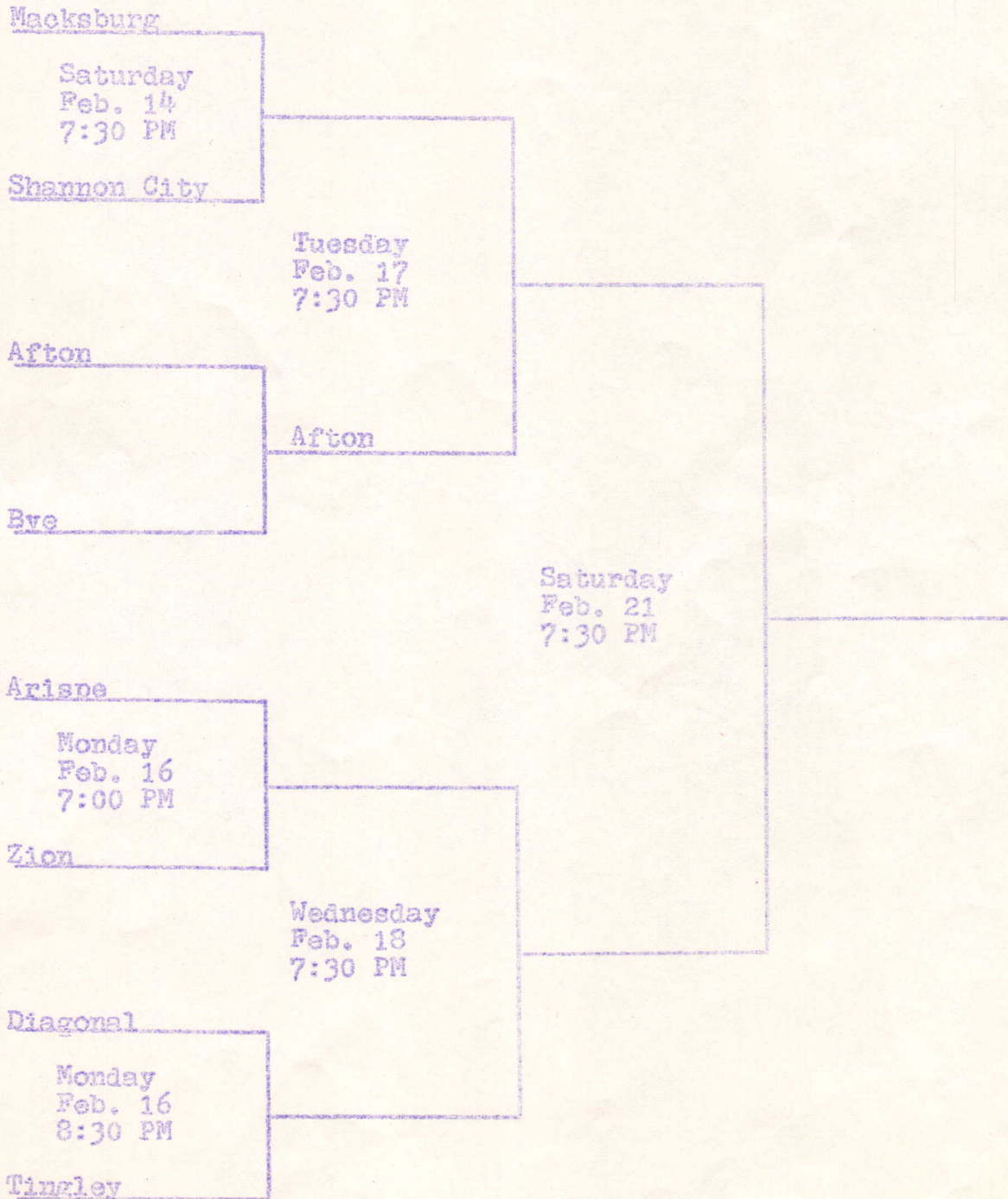
TINGLEY TOPPERETTES

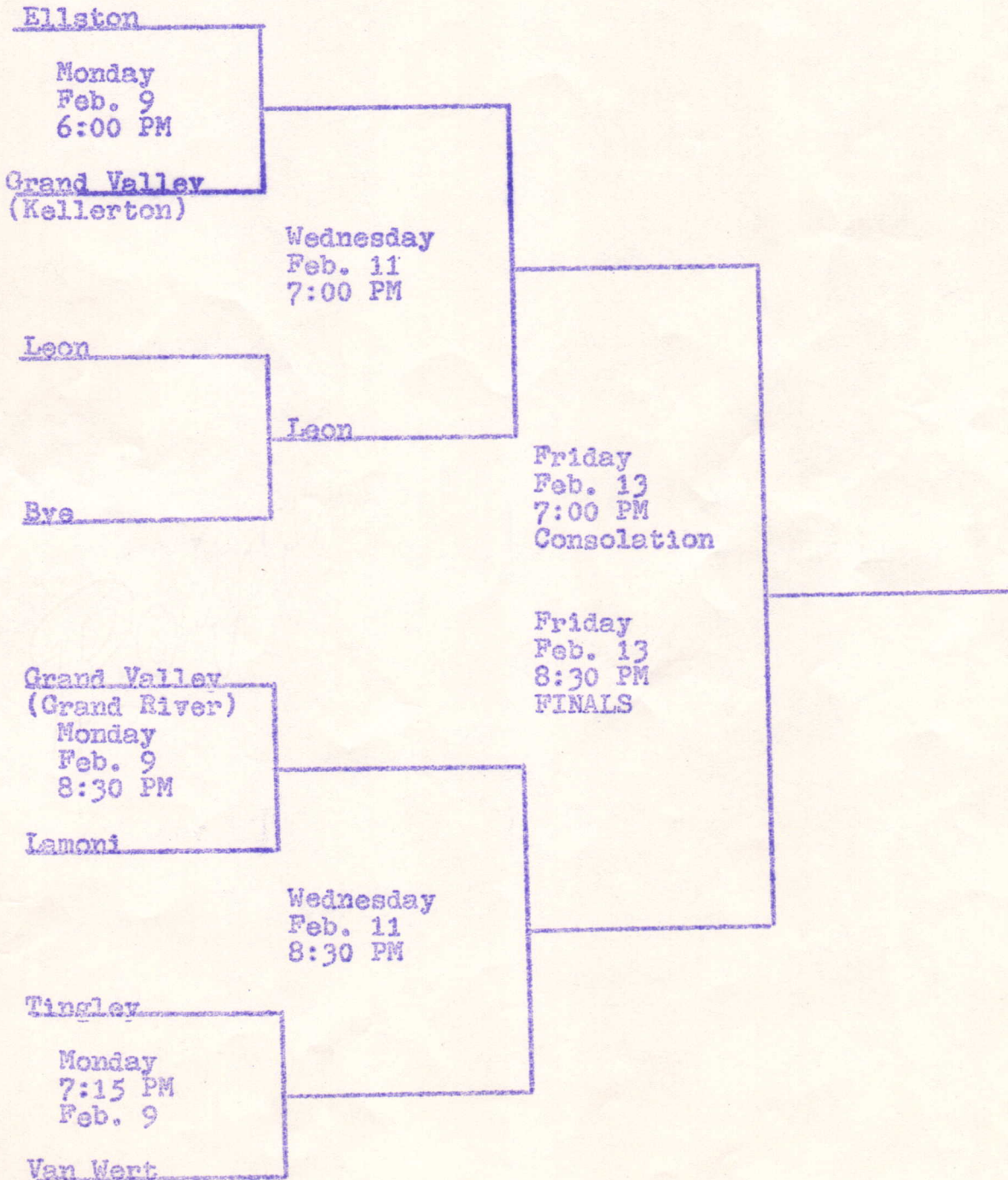

AMERICAN LEGION

On July 10, 1920, a meeting of all ex-service men was held at the City Hall, where Beens Barber Shop is now located, for the purpose of organizing an American Legion Post for the town of Tingley.

By the last of July a charter had been received for the new Post and the Post Number was 516. A name for the Post would be chosen at a later meeting. At this meeting of sixteen ex-servicemen, officers were elected. They are as follows: Post Adjutant, W. S. Breckenridge; Post Finance officer, Clarence Bischoff; Post Master-at-Arms, Ray Grout; Post Historian, James Richards; and Post Champion, Carl Ball. The Commander and Adjutant appointed a committee to look after renting the room over the old bank building for Post purposes. The dues were placed at three dollars per year. The charter members were: John Boyc, Clarence Bischoff, Allen Aikin, Leon Lupher, Robert G. Hogue, Carl

This building burned so the meetings were held in the homes of the members. At the present the Legion meets in the old depot, now Legion Hall, which it purchased from the railroad sometime during the 1940's.

About a year later the ladies auxiliary of the Post was organized with the following officers. Mrs. C. W. Roush, President; and Miss Bertha Houge, Treasuerer. This organization started with fifteen members.
